

Semi-Deponent Verbs

- *audeō, audēre, ausus sum*, “to dare”
- *gaudeō, gaudēre, gāvīsus sum*, “to rejoice, be glad”
- *soleō, solēre, solitus sum*, “to be accustomed”

Present, Imperfect, and Future Tenses: Regular

Perfect, Pluperfect, and Future Perfect Tenses: Deponent

Synopsis of *audeō, audēre, ausus sum* (1 sg.)

Present	<i>audeō</i>	“I dare”
Imperfect	<i>audēbam</i>	“I was daring”
Future	<i>audēbō</i>	“I will dare”
Perfect	<i>ausus sum</i>	“I (have) dared”
Pluperfect	<i>ausus eram</i>	“I had dared”
Future Perfect	<i>ausus erō</i>	“I will have dared”

Synopsis of *gaudeō, gaudēre, gāvīsus sum* (3 pl.)

Present	<i>gaudent</i>	“they rejoice”
Imperfect	<i>gaudēbant</i>	“they were rejoicing”
Future	<i>gaudēbunt</i>	“they will rejoice”
Perfect	<i>gāvīsī sunt</i>	“they (have) rejoiced”
Pluperfect	<i>gāvīsī erant</i>	“they had rejoiced”
Future Perfect	<i>gāvīsī erunt</i>	“they will have rejoiced”

Synopsis of *soleō, solēre, solitus sum* (3 sg.)

Present	<i>solet</i>	“he is accustomed”
Imperfect	<i>solēbat</i>	“he was accustomed”
Future	<i>solēbit</i>	“he will be accustomed”
Perfect	<i>solitus est</i>	“he was (<i>or</i> has been) accustomed”
Pluperfect	<i>solitus erat</i>	“he had been accustomed”
Future Perfect	<i>solitus erit</i>	“he will have been accustomed”
